Bristol Bay Area Health Corporation

The Bristol Bay Area Health Corporation (BBAHC) provides health care for the Bristol Bay Region. Its Community Health Aides provide continuing primary health care and emergency medical services in the villages. Health Aides provide preventive and health surveillance services to include prenatal care, well child exams, and school age fluoride treatments. Patients who require further treatment are referred to the health corporation's Kakanak Hospital. Kakanak Hospital is a 16 bed facility that serves patients of all ages in the area of medical care, pediatrics, obstetrics, well baby, out-patients, skilled and observational beds, swing beds, home health, community health, infant learning, maternal-child health, emergency room, WIC, mental health, and drug and alcohol services. Ancillary support services include: audiology, dental, diabetes, laboratory, medevac, optometry, radiology, social services, and specialty clinics. Patients requiring care not provided at Kakanak are referred to other regional medical facilities including Alaska Native Medical Center for those that are of Native descent.

Office hours are Monday – Friday, 8:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

Emergency services/crisis intervention is available 24 hours per day, 7 days per week. After hours calls are dispatched to Counselors through the Dillingham Police Department or Counselors can be reached through Kananak Hospital.

The BBAHC Alcoholism and Drug Abuse Program offers a wide variety of services. Provides community education and resource materials, including video/audio tapes. Services are also provided at Jake's Place, a 12-bed residential facility available for those clients who are assessed as needing more structured, intensive treatment. Located next to Kananak Hospital. Walk-ins are welcome.

Program services include:

- **Assessment and Evaluation:** Assessments and Evaluations are done at the request of the client or a referring agency.
- **Outpatient Counseling:** One on one counseling sessions, usually one hour long for 8-12 weeks, followed by 3-6 months of Aftercare.
- **Aftercare Program:** Aftercare is a group meeting. Sessions are 2 hours long, once a week.
- **Transitional Care:** For people on their way to treatment, returning from treatment, or village residents enrolled in the Outpatient Program.
- **Residential Care:** This new program provides supervised living for clients waiting to go to and returning from inpatient treatment outside the region.
- **Follow-up:** Contacts are designed to assist clients with ongoing sobriety issues.

Behavioral Health Center staff brings a variety of skills, education and techniques to the center and offer psychotherapy, counseling, case management and life skills training. Village based workers provide on-site services with support from office staff.

The Behavioral Health Center offers a variety of services to all villages in the Bristol Bay area, including:

Emergency Services – Outreach, crisis intervention, and referrals are available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to all of the Bristol Bay area. After-hours and weekend emergency calls are dispatched to counselors by Dillingham Police at (907) 842-5354.

Outpatient Services – Individual, couple, family, group counseling and psychotherapy is available for adults, children and adolescents throughout Bristol Bay. Consultation and evaluation services are available to schools, hospitals, court systems, and social service agencies.

Psychiatric Services – Psychiatric assessments and evaluations are available by appointment only. Call the Counseling Center office for scheduling of intake and appointments.

Child and Adolescent Services – Offers crisis intervention, individual, family and group therapy to children and adolescents with various emotional and behavioral difficulties. Consultation services and presentations on specific mental health services to children and adolescents are also available.

Community Support Services – Specialized outpatient and residential services provided to adults with chronic mental illness.

Village Outreach & Counseling Services - Outreach counseling, referral and case management services are available in the village through Family Service Workers and during itinerant village travel by clinical staff in the regional office. Call for current travel schedules.

Suicide Prevention/Education – Available throughout Bristol Bay to communities, schools, or groups by request.

Critical Incident Stress Debriefing – Debriefing services for first responders to a traumatic incident.

“Our House” – A short-term crisis/respite center for individuals suffering with chronic or persistent mental illness. Clients receive comprehensive assistance.

Fees: On a sliding scale based on income, no person will be denied services due to lack of funds.

Confidentiality: Information is released only with written client consent.

A Child Advocacy Center (CAC) is a child –focused, facility-based program where representatives from many fields meet to discuss and make decisions about the investigation, treatment, and prosecution of child abuse cases. They also work together to prevent further victimization of children, providing outreach presentations and activities.

This multidisciplinary team approach brings together all the professionals and agencies needed to offer complete services: law enforcement, child protective services, prosecution, mental health and the medical community. CACs are community –based programs designed to meet the unique needs of its community.

CACs have many benefits: more immediate follow-up to child abuse reports; more efficient medical and mental health services or referrals; reduction in number of child victim interviews; increased successful prosecution; and consistent support for child victims and supportive adults.

This wrap-around approach, with follow-up services provided by the CAC, ensures that children receive child-focused services in a child –friendly environment-one in which the child comes first!

Located in Dillingham, “Nitaput” Child Advocacy Center (CAC) provides services to every village in the Bristol Bay region. “Nitaput” offers education, information, and family support. Families from outside of Dillingham are brought in for the interview and medical needs. Families are never billed for services.

All information that is gathered at “Nitaput” is confidential and only shared with the multidisciplinary team upon the consent of the parent or guardian.

Core Components of a Children’s Advocacy Center

- A separate, child-friendly facility for interviewing and providing services to child victims and their non-offending family members. At “Nitaput” Child Advocacy Center the interview, medical exam, family support, and counseling are all done under the same roof. All the rooms are child and family friendly.
- Five core disciplines: law enforcement, child protective services, prosecution, mental health and medical. “Nitaput” also provides a child/family advocate-case manager to help the family through the process and to provide follow-up services.
- Coordinated multidisciplinary investigation team. This team works together at “Nitaput” to provide the best care and services for the Bristol Bay region. The entire team is available for the family to answer questions and to make sure all the information needed is collected. The interview is video taped so that the child only has to go through the stress of the interview one time.
- Regular interdisciplinary case reviews. The “Nitaput” team meets monthly to keep updated on cases.
- Intensive case follow-up. The “Nitaput” case manager contacts each family on a regular basis, providing information, referrals, coordination, and other services the family may need.
- Specially-trained professionals. Each team member is specially trained to effectively and sensitively gather the information needed and to provide the most effective services to the family.

HEALTH EDUCATION.....842-9548

The Health Education Program consists of three components: 1. **The WIC program** (see p. 11) provides foods and nutrition education to children under 5 as well as pregnant, breastfeeding, and post-partum women. Additionally, the WIC program supports breastfeeding by a pump loan program. 2. The currently developing **Comprehensive Nicotine Dependence Treatment program**. A Resource Library is also available with a variety of videos, posters, pamphlets and books. In addition, a blender, skillets, and a number of bread machines are available to schools and childcare programs to be loaned for nutrition education purposes.

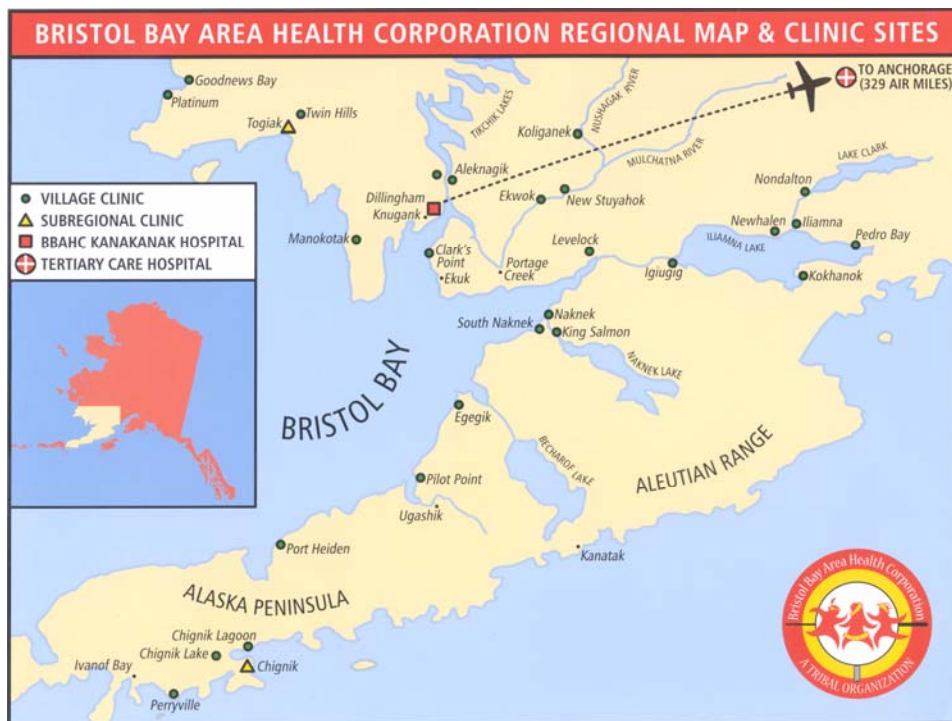

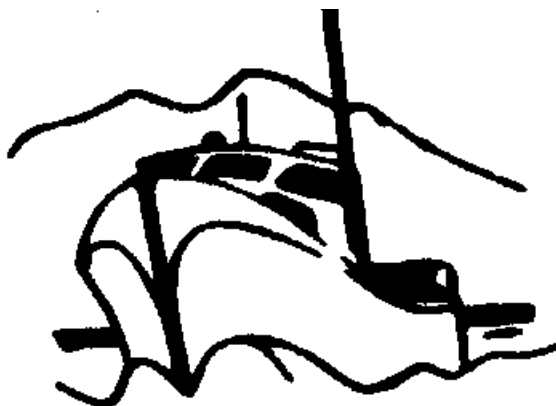

Helping tribal members get title to their land and help in managing their property is the foundation of the Realty Program’s work. Realty staff can help with trespass cases, gravel sales, partitions, easements and subdivisions. Landowners are urged to take advantage of another important Realty service, help in the writing of wills, to avoid inheritance disputes among heirs and family members.

VPSO Program 842-5257

Village Public Safety Officers provide law enforcement of misdemeanor crimes in rural villages, and can serve legal orders, such as restraining orders. The VPSO’s primary responsibility is to ensure safety, for example, coordinating search and rescue or responding to immediate danger situations. Village Public Safety Officers can provide community presentations about safety, for example, water safety.

BBNA’s Social Services Programs work with families and individuals in need of support and assistance. The ICWA Program provides a Tribal liaison with the state in Child in Need of Aid/Child Protective cases. Limited emergency transportation and handicapped access van available. Limited air transportation for village clients.

ELDERLY SERVICES 842-4139

Provides nutrition and supportive services to elders. Hot lunches are provided for elders at the school in 18 villages, lunches are delivered to homebound elders in those villages. Supportive services are offered to elders throughout the region, including assistance with applications for Social Security and Adult Public Assistance, and homemaker and chore services.

HEALTHY FAMILIES..... 842-4139

Healthy Families Program provides support, advocacy, and intensive home visiting to those families with newborn babies up to the age of 5.

PERSONAL CARE SERVICES 842-4139

Provides in-home care to elders or medically frail people in the region. This service may include light housekeeping, personal hygiene, reminding clients to take medication, and meal preparation. A trained Personal Care Attendant under the supervision of a Registered Nurse provides personal care services. Care Coordination is provided to assist people in accessing other services such as medical equipment and legal services.

VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION PROGRAM..... 842-4139

CHILD CARE DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT..... 1-888-285-2262

Pays for childcare, whether provided by friends, family, or licensed care giver. Parents choose their own provider. Requirements are that your children are: Alaskan Native descendants, employed, and or attending classes, or in employment training, or engaged in subsistence activities. Amount of assistance is determined on a sliding scale

DAY CARE ASSISTANCE 842-2228

If you are working, seeking work, going to school or participating in training you may be eligible for Day Care Assistance. Program covers from 25% to 97% of day care costs, depending on your income. Child must be in a licensed day care. Transitional childcare assistance is available for parents who are just coming off AFDC. Transitional assistance can be used to pay for day care in a home with a business license.

EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING PROGRAM 842-2262

This program assists Alaska Natives accomplish their vocational/educational goals and consists of the following programs

A.) TRAINING PROGRAMS

1. Classroom training – Assists student with tuition, books, tools, room and board.
2. Adult Vocational Training Program – assists student obtain vocational goals.
3. On the Job Training – BBNA reimburses up to 50% of participant’s wages to the employer if employer hires and trains participant whose skills and experience would not otherwise qualify them for the job.

B.) SUPPORTIVE SERVICES/DIRECT EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMS

Assists with costs of employment including transportation to the work place and purchase of necessary work clothing.

C.) JOB OPPORTUNITIES AND BASIC SKILLS PROGRAM

Designed to educate, train, and help employ AFDC recipients to help prevent long term welfare dependency.

D.) JOB DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

Helps prepare a resume, work on interviewing skills, job coaching, and career counseling.

GENERAL ASSISTANCE..... 842-2262

Provides basic financial assistance to families or individuals with little or no income who meet the eligibility criteria.

HIGHER EDUCATION..... 842-2262

Provides scholarships to Bristol Bay Alaska Native students to attend college. Can provide financial aid counseling to students.

YOUTH EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM AND TRAINING..... 842-2262

Offers Native youth (14-21) an opportunity to gain classroom training, work experience, and vocational exploration.

Emergency Services: Provide immediate safety services including emergency transportation, shelter, food and 24 hour crisis intervention assistance accessed through the Crisis Line. Provides Advocacy services including accompaniment and assistance with courts, law enforcement, medical services and other providers for victims of domestic violence or sexual assault. Provides shelter, food, clothing and other residential support services. Children are welcome, but must be accompanied by a non-offending parent or guardian. Unaccompanied teens may be admitted with consent of their parent or legal guardian. SAFE will also provide second-hand clothing in emergency situations (e.g. fire) and to outlying villages.

Counseling: Provides short-term crisis intervention counseling for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault and operates a 24 hour toll-free crisis line for all of Bristol Bay. Referral and support in accessing other, longer term services for participants who request it. Self-help groups for women meet every Thursday evening (topics rotate), with childcare provided for those attending. Group for teens 12-19 meets every Tuesday evening.

SART (Sexual Assault Response Team): SAFE participates in a coordinated response to adult and child victims of sexual assault. SART can be accessed through SAFE crisis line, BBAHC/SANE (Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner), and/or through village, local or state law enforcement. Services and assistance is available regardless of whether victim(s) want to make a police report. Victims of sexual assault should contact SAFE directly for assistance in accessing confidential support services.

SISTR (Safety In Sobriety Through Recovery): Provides safe shelter for women who are battered and chemically dependent while they access treatment through Jake's Place. Women with children can live in the shelter for extended periods while participating in IOP/OP (Intensive Out Patient), aftercare and/or other sobriety support activities.

Transportation: Provides emergency airfare to the nearest safe shelter to victims of domestic violence / sexual assault and their families when remaining in the village is unsafe. Transportation is provided only one-way. SAFE also provides local ground transportation to program participants in limited circumstances.

Activities: Sponsors alcohol-free activities for women and children on Friday evenings at the SAFE office. **Children's programs** are offered periodically and include structured play, art, and education and support groups. Groups meet at the SAFE office and are open to the public. For more information or to find out when a program is next offered, call the SAFE office.

Legal Services: Provides legal information, referral and advocacy to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. Services include assistance to adult and child victims in obtaining Domestic Violence Restraining Orders, court accompaniment, and advocacy with various agencies involved in legal proceedings. Many services can be provided telephonically. SAFE also operates a daily court watch and tribal notification program linking tribes, villages and regional groups with updated information on criminal and civil justice issues.

Outreach & Education: SAFE provides community education on Domestic Violence and Sexual

Assault, including Personal Safety for children K-12. Sessions on family violence issues are provided weekly, monthly, and quarterly. SAFE's Village Services will make every effort to meet any village request for a presentation within travel fund constraints. Will also provide reference materials on request. Certified staff provide professional trainings on domestic violence, sexual assault, child abuse & neglect, sexual harassment and related subjects for law enforcement, educators, tribal and village leaders, members of the faith community, businesses, and other human service providers.

Crimes Compensation: Victims of domestic violence/sexual assault and other crimes may pick up crime compensation forms at the SAFE office. Staff can provide assistance in completing these forms and accessing VCC.

Will not provide compensation for property damage.

Transportation Assistance

Many agencies provide air and/or ground transportation to their clients under certain circumstances. If you are receiving or seeking services from an agency, and need help with transportation, ASK!!! The following is a partial listing of local agencies that may provide limited transportation.

SAFE – Provides emergency air fare to victims of domestic violence/sexual assault and their families when remaining in the village is unsafe. Transportation is provided only one-way, and the only to the Shelter. SAFE also provides local transportation to clients in limited circumstances. 842-2320

BBAHC Behavioral Health Center – Provides emergency air transportation to clients in a mental health crisis, as determined by the program. Also provides local transportation to clients in limited circumstances. 842-1230

BBAHC Social Services – Arranges some transportation expenses for Medicaid recipients, and may be able to authorize expenses for low-income patients who must travel to receive necessary medical services. 842-9338.
